Hi,

For information I am interested in this position and keen to furtherer develop the club after a sigfnicant progress within the club this year.

The role of chairperson is critical to all clubs.

The role assumes responsibility helping to develop the club and ensuring processes within the club comply with GAA regulations.

To this end I in this role I think it is important we put in place our own internal processes in (conforming to GAA requirements) across the range of roles.

This would mean putting in place processes for requirements of each role so we have templates to manage most situations as they arise.

The key is to put in place a systems that can be passed on to incoming committee's so they do n't have to start from scratch which has been the case over the years. We should have in place processes that cover issues that come up during the season rather than an unclear haze (so & so might know on that etc.) as to how things should be done.

Children's Officer: We should put in place a protocol as to how we handle situations that may come up in line with GAA requirements. Then going forward new committees will have a bank of information to help them familiarise how matters are handled within our club.

Secretary:

We need to ensure process and information systems are in place that guide us on how we handle matters, contact details around GAA & LGFA County Board, SDCC Community Centre local schools etc.

Finance is another one. Michael is the Treasurer but he is not responsible for fundraising. However it is important we support Michael by putting in place a finance policy. Also as Chair I would need to be included with access details to our bank account.

At the moment we pay as required on an ad hoc basis. This is unfair on the treasurer. If I am Chairperson we will need to put in a finance policy as to how payments and receipts are made, e.g. Exec committee Chair, Sec & Treasurer can agree & approve payments up to €300.00 & subsequently report at the next committee meeting.
